Dear Parents and Guardians,

I hope this message finds you well and that the first week of school has been a positive start for you and your child. It has been wonderful to see our students settling back into routines, reconnecting with friends, and engaging enthusiastically in their learning. It was also lovely to see so many of you at the Nursery/Creche stay and play session on Wednesday.

As we begin the term, I would like to take this opportunity to share a few important reminders:

School Uniform

- Children should wear the **light blue polo shirt** with **dark blue shorts, skirts, or trousers**.
- Socks should be **plain and not colourful**.
- Shoes must be **dark (mainly black), closed-toe, and safe for school activities**.
- Please note that **sandals, crocs, or flip-flops are not permitted**, as they are unsafe for school use.
- The PE uniform should only be worn on days when children have PE.
- Also **a hat** is very important for breaktime and outdoor activities.

Healthy Start to the Day

- A **nutritious breakfast** is essential, especially as many children have **PE or swimming in the morning**. Without breakfast, they often feel tired before snack time.

Snacks and Hydration

- Please pack **a healthy snack** for your child. Items such as crisps (chips), popcorn, sweets (candies), and chocolate are **not considered healthy options**.
- Ensure your child **brings plenty of water**, which is particularly important in our current climate.
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Thank you for your continued support in helping us maintain a safe, healthy, and positive environment for all students. Together, we can ensure that every child is ready to learn and thrive.



KS3 Round Square Passport Pilot Initiative

What is Round Square?

Round Square is a global network of schools, including BSL, who are committed to character development and global citizenship. Its philosophy is built around six core values, known as the IDEALS: Internationalism, Democracy, Environmentalism, Adventure, Leadership, and Service.

At BSL, we believe education goes beyond academic success and includes developing key personal qualities such as resilience, problem-solving, leadership, and responsibility.

What is the Passport Pilot?

In April 2026, BSL will launch the Key Stage 3 Round Square Passport, a structured way for students to record and reflect on their personal growth throughout their secondary years.

Ahead of this launch, a pilot group will run from January to March 2026. Students will meet with Mrs Maclean regularly to trial hands-on challenges linked to the IDEALS, test the Passport system and provide feedback to help refine the programme.

Participants will act as "Founding Designers", helping ensure the Passport is meaningful and effective when introduced across the school.

We look forward to working with this group of students to create something impactful for the BSL community and to working together to develop well rounded, reflective, and engaged young people in all year groups.

University updates



It's university application season, and excitement is building!

Every week, our Year 13 students submit new applications, prepare for interviews, polish portfolios and – best of all – begin receiving offers from universities around the world. Our University Counsellor, Mr David Nyamikou, and IB Diploma Coordinator, Mrs Jane Snell, have been working closely with students and families to guide them through every step of this important journey.

We are incredibly proud of the hard work our students have put into their applications, and it's wonderful to see universities recognising their talent and potential. The Class of 2026 has already been awarded an amazing US \$141,000 in scholarships – and we're just getting started!

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Secondary School

Year 13 Mock Exams

Year 13 will end the Mock Exam period on Wednesday next week. They will then have two days to complete their Extended Essay (EE) Viva Voce (VV) amongst other assessment tasks. The EE VV is similar to a university viva, soutenance, or thesis defense. Students will discuss their research methodology and outcomes, as well as their personal growth, and the wider implications of their findings. Most importantly they will celebrate their achievement with their Extended Essay Supervisor.

EE Research Questions this year are very varied and have involved lab work, library research, surveys and questionnaires, interviews with representatives from Togolese Ministries, NGOs, UN organisations, and experts or academics in their fields. The result is a very personal research journey, and an academically robust 4000 word essay.

To what extent do locally sourced clay and activated charcoal derived from agricultural waste remove turbidity and heavy metal ions (e.g., lead or copper) from water, and how do their adsorption properties compare to commercial filter media?

To what extent has Tesla's investment in product innovation and R&D contributed to its market leadership in the US electric vehicle industry from 2018 to 2025?

How do variations in soil texture affect the time taken for infiltration across cultivated and uncultivated sites at Kailend Farm, Togo?

To what extent do variations in environmental conditions and socio-economic factors account for the spatial disparities in rice production between the Savanes and Maritime region of Togo?

To what extent has Apple's product portfolio diversification contributed to its financial performance in the U.S. consumer technology sector?

Secondary School

We were pleased to welcome Data ScienceTech Institute (DSTI) – France’s first specialist school for computer and data engineering – to our school this week for a thought-provoking session on the question: “Is Artificial Intelligence real intelligence?”

DSTI staff engaged a small group of students and staff in a rich discussion on how artificial intelligence is reshaping business and politics, while also raising critical ethical questions about innovation, responsibility, and the limits of machine intelligence. The session encouraged students to think beyond technology itself and reflect on what truly defines human intelligence in an AI-driven world.

With campuses in Paris and Nice, DSTI offers industry-focused programmes in data science, cybersecurity, and artificial intelligence, all taught in English to an international student community.
