Thanks to the College authority, Mr Ernest, Mr Obaro, Ms Laura and everyone that helped in making the trip a success.



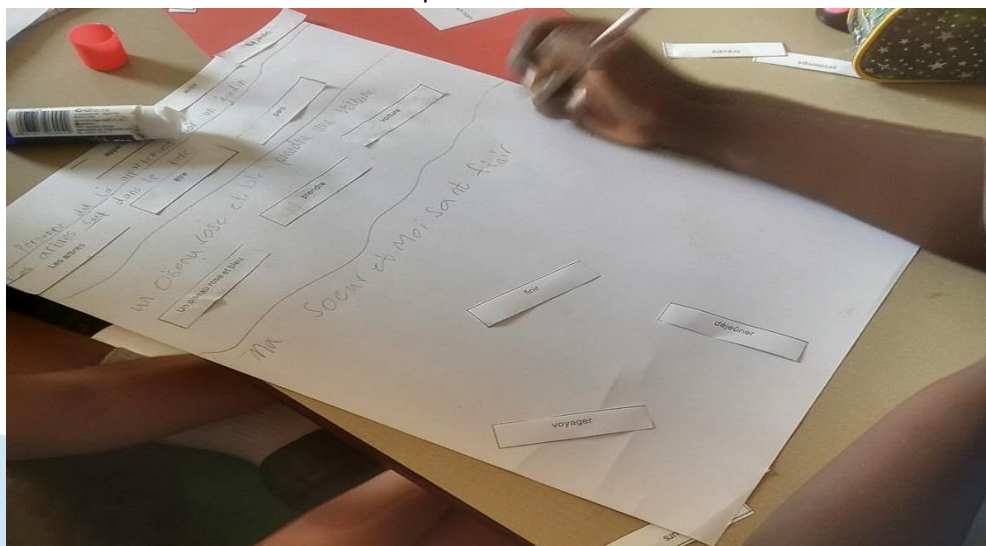
IBDP TOK Exhibition

The Year 12 students presented an exhibition for the Theory of Knowledge (TOK) course, an internal IBDP assessment, showcasing their understanding of TOK concepts. Each student selected three objects, or images of objects, and provided written commentary on each one. The exhibition required students to connect their chosen objects to one of the 35 "IA prompts" provided in the TOK course. This assessment evaluates the students' ability to illustrate how TOK concepts manifest in the world around us, demonstrating their critical thinking and analytical skills.

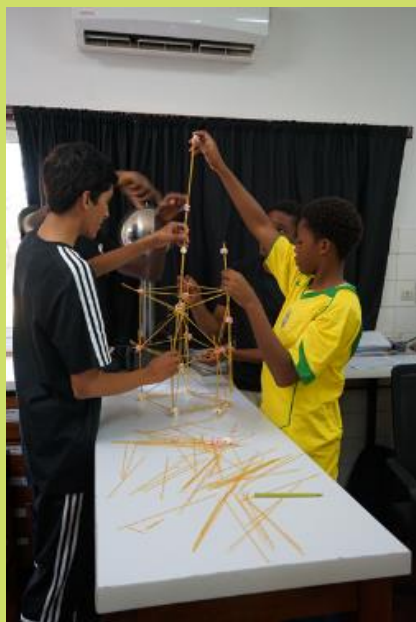
Appointment of Dr Mark Evans as Education Policies and Strategies Advisor

STEAM enrichment

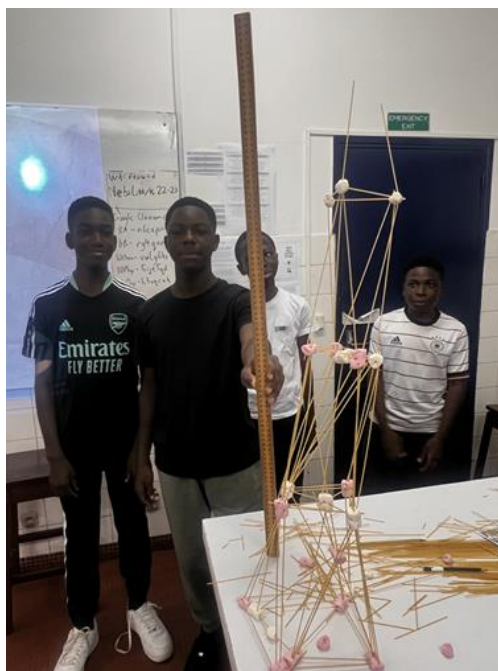

La parution de la nouvelle édition du Dictionnaire de la Laïcité est annoncée. Vous en êtes l'un des rédacteurs. Quelles sont les particularités de cet ouvrage ?

Réponse

Ce dictionnaire défend l'idée que la laïcité est le ciment d'un « bien vivre ensemble » et que le principe de séparation des Églises et de l'État fait son chemin en Europe comme dans le monde du XXI^e siècle. Ce livre est le fruit du travail d'une cinquantaine de chercheurs, d'historiens, de sociologues, d'avocats, de journaliste Il a été codirigé par Martine Cerf, secrétaire générale de l'association EGALE (Égalité- Laïcité-Europe) et Marc Horwitz, membre fondateur de l'association EGALE (Égalité- Laïcité-Europe).

Question

Quelle en est votre contribution ?

Réponse

J'ai étudié la problématique de la laïcité au Togo qui est un cas représentatif du phénomène en Afrique. Tout d'abord j'ai relevé les contradictions qui existent entre la proclamation de la laïcité dans les textes juridiques et les réalités que l'on observe dans les pratiques quotidiennes. Ensuite, j'ai montré les causes de cette situation qui sont d'ordre historique et socioculturel essentiellement. Enfin, j'ai proposé une redéfinition de la laïcité en Afrique qui doit tenir compte des particularités de ses particularités.

Question

Quelles sont les autres questions que vous avez déjà étudiées dans vos recherches ?

Réponse

Je m'intéresse essentiellement aux questions qui portent sur « Espaces, Langues et Cultures des Sociétés africaines » à travers les textes littéraires. Les résultats de mes recherches sont publiés dans des ouvrages universitaires, notamment « Les Femmes dans le processus littéraire au Togo » (Bern ; New York : P. Lang, c1999.), « Les Acteurs du livre au Togo » (Edition : Graines de Pensées, Lomé, 2007), « Littérature togolaise : Discours et figures d'autorité » ((2018, Éditions Continents, Lomé), « Particip'Action » (31/12/2010 Université de Lomé). Par ailleurs, lorsque j'étais représentant de l'Afrique dans le Comité Scientifique de l'Agence Universitaire de la Francophonie (Littérature d'Enfance et de Jeunesse), j'ai dirigé des travaux de recherche sur le sujet et des résultats sont publiés, Nationalités, mondialisation et littérature d'enfance et de jeunesse (éditions des archives contemporaines, Paris, 2007)...

Question

Quels sont les intérêts de vos recherches pour vos élèves à BSL ?

Réponse

Ils sont divers et nombreux pour une école internationale:

En cours d'apprentissage de langue et de la civilisation française, je partage avec les élèves mes expériences sur la complexité et les opportunités de l'apprentissage de la langue en situation particulière : influence de la langue maternelle et de deux langues étrangères

Encours de IBDP, les cours de Langue et de littérature bénéficie d'une part des recherches en critique littéraire et d'autre part des avantages de la littérature générale et comparée.

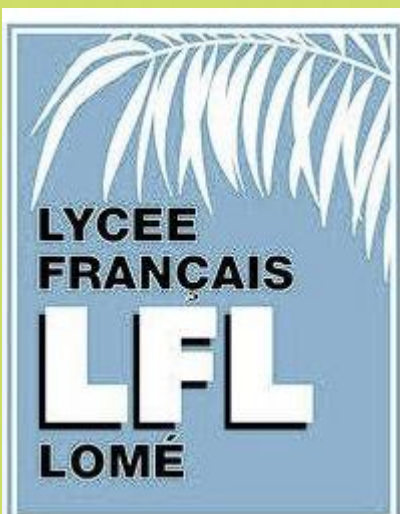
